

FROM THE COORDINATOR

Welcome Avoyelles!! The Avoyelles Community and Youth Coalition is very happy to present the first edition of a youth magazine, "It Starts Here-----Avoyelles Parish." The coalition is thrilled to present to Avoyelles Parish a magazine that will highlight positive events that our youth are participating in. We are so proud of the wonderful things that our youth are involved in and want to ensure that the local communities can share in their excitement.

First, I would like to give everyone a little bit of history regarding the Avoyelles Community & Youth Coalition. In 2003, Act 1225 of the 2003 Louisiana Legislative Session and the Louisiana Children's Cabinet, enacted law that each parish would be responsible in developing youth planning boards. These boards had the responsibility to address many issues and needs of local youth and help coordinate services and programs to help address these needs. The role for the youth planning boards was to encourage positive development. Members included stakeholders from education, behavioral health, social services, faith community, business community, judges, early childhood development, prosecutors, parent organizations, law enforcement, youth serving organizations, as well as community volunteers and youth. After 2003, the coalition was established and began helping with issues concerning our local youth. The two organizations merged for the betterment of services to our youth.

For the last three years, the platform for the coalition was suicide prevention. In January 2019, the coalition was afforded the opportunity to change the platform to Reducing Underage Drinking Ages 9-20. Avoyelles Parish ranked in the top ten parishes in the state for underage drinking beginning age of 9. These statistics were obtained through the Community Caring Youth Survey's, which are conducted in the Avoyelles Parish School System grades 6th-12th. These surveys are conducted every two years. The results of the survey did reveal Avoyelles Parish ranked higher than the State average in 5 categories. These categories included 1) 30 Day Use of Alcohol, (consuming more than 5 alcoholic drinks within 30 days); 2) Binge Drinking; 3) Parental Permission; 4) Relative Permission and 5) 21 or Older Purchasing the alcohol for the youth.

The Avoyelles Community & Youth Coalition's goal is to spread awareness. Our goal is to get community members and families to think about helping our youth make healthy choices and to think about cultures. We look to prevent our youth from being involved in a fatality, due to consumption of alcohol and getting behind the wheel of a vehicle and driving. The coalition is comprised of such a wonderful diverse group of individuals and I'm honored to have each-and-every one of them working together to help spread the awareness here in Avoyelles Parish.

I'm pleased to share with you that our magazine is through the efforts of the youth members of this coalition. The name of the magazine was also decided by our youth and I'm proud of the effort that they have made to help make this first edition successful. I would like to extend to all of Avoyelles Parish to consider volunteering a little time to help our coalition help our youth. Remember, they are our future. The coalition looks forward to working with the high schools this coming school year. I invite you to check out our webpage at www.avoyellescyc.org. I hope that everyone enjoys the first edition.

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






Project Graduation 2019

Thames, and the faculty, senior parents become organized and began to plan graduation night for their seniors. The parents were able to approach local businesses, to gain support for Project Graduation through food, beverage or monetary donations. Wendy McCann, a committee member said of the project, "the students enjoyed the hot tubs, water slides and the pools all during the night." Laurie Gauthier, fellow committee member also felt that Project Graduation was a success. Laurie shared that the committee received positive feedback from the senior parents and parents indicated how appreciative they were that their children had a safe, fun filled graduation night. "I am very pleased on how the night went and I would do it again," she said.



Committee member Lauri Knoll, whose son was a member of APCS graduating class, shared that as her son entered his senior year, she had no worries concerning post-graduation parties and the risk of drinking and driving for him as well as fellow students. Project Graduation had been in place with Avoyelles Public Charter School and was well organized. Laurie stated that she knew that students would be able to enjoy an alcohol free, parent supervised after party and lock in. Lauri shared knowing that no one was able to leave unsupervised or drive away and absolutely no drinking was comforting. "When I was asked to be on the 2019 Project Graduation Committee, I was extremely excited to be a part of a committee which I held in such high standard and admired." The organization was able to provide an after party of fun and safety from start to finish. The children were safely in their homes, the day after graduation. Lauri stated, "I hope this idea can be infectious throughout our surrounding community and throughout the state."



"DID YOU KNOW?"

Every two years, the Community Caring Youth Surveys are conducted in the Avoyelles Parish Schools 6th grade through 12th grade. The following statistics are the results of the survey conducted in 2016. These statistics resulted in determining that Avoyelles Parish ranked in the top ten parishes for underage drinking beginning at age 9, thus resulting in an initiative of Reducing Underage Drinking Ages 9-20.

- 1.) 30-day Use- Percentage of youth indicating any alcohol use in the past 30 days. 25.7%
- 2.) Youth Binge Drinking-Percentage of youth indicating binge drinking (5 or more drinks in a row) in the past two weeks. 16.9%
- 3.) Age of First Use Ever-Average age of reported first alcohol use 12.90%
- 4.) Age at First Use Regularly- Average age of reported first drinking alcoholic beverages regularly one to two times per month 14.04%
- 5.) Perception of Risk-Percentage of youth indicating that people are at moderate or great risk of harming themselves physically or other ways if they drink 1 or 2 drinks nearly every day. 57.3%
- 6.) Perceived Use by Peers-The percentage of youth students in your grade who you think drank alcohol sometime in the past month. 60.6%
- 7.) Youth Obtain Alcohol w/fake ID-Percentage of youth who indicated that when they used alcohol in the past year they usually bought alcohol themselves using a fake ID. 5.3%
- 8.) Youth Obtain Alcohol at home w/Parent Permission 29.4%
- 9.) Youth Obtain Alcohol at home w/o Parent Permission 16.2%
- 10.) Youth Obtain Alcohol w/Relative (not a parent) 31.1%
- 11.) Youth Obtain Alcohol -Stranger 9.4%
- 12.) Youth Obtain Alcohol -Someone Over 21 (obtained or purchased alcohol) 35.6%
- 13.) Youth Obtain Alcohol -Someone Under 21 (obtained alcohol from someone under the age of 21) 17.4%
- 15.) Youth Obtain Alcohol bought w/o Fake ID 8.6%

The following categories indicate that Avoyelles Parish outranked the State average:

- 1) 30 Day Use Avoyelles 25.7% State 18.1%
- 2) Binge Drinking Avoyelles 16.9% State 10.4%
- 3) Youth Obtain Alcohol w/Parent's Permission Avoyelles 29.4% State 21.9%
- 4) Youth Obtain Alcohol w/Relative's Permission Avoyelles 31.1% State 23.9%
- 5) Youth Obtain Alcohol Someone Over Age 21 Avoyelles 35.6% State 30.4%




